At the heart of our life together is relationships—our relationships with each other, with those in our community, and most of all, with God.

In the following pages you will read how God is blessing St. Paul's as we seek to grow *broad* and *deep* in these relationships. You'll see numbers that tell a story of growth: 5% growth in Sunday worshippers over last year, 45-50 people enjoying spaghetti dinner weekly during the spring and fall semesters, over \$350,000 paid towards retiring our church mortgage debt and more than \$40,000 given through the CONNECT Ministry providing financial assistance to our community in need.




The real story under these numbers is the *impact* of our relationships. Lonely hearts are gladdened as we build deep friendships by sharing meals, studying, praying, and serving together. St. Paul's is a servant-leader in our city as our members lead non-profit organizations and we invite sister churches to join us in serving. Hope is built through our life and worship together. This hope in Jesus Christ is Good News for us and for our city, too.

In the coming year, we will continue building relationships, both *broad* and *deep*. We seek to grow *broad*, sharing our life together at St. Paul's with more people. Our goal is to have 350 people worshipping at St. Paul's weekly. We seek also to grow *deep*, bringing people deeper into the transformative love of Christ. Our goal is to have 100% of our Average Weekly Attendance belong to a Group where they are known, loved, and grow in their relationship with Jesus.

It is a tremendous privilege to journey along with you in our life at St. Paul's. Day by day, we are being formed into the body of Christ. All of us together are Christ's body, and each of us is part of it.



CREATING AN ACADEMY OF MINISTERS

Invest in people of all ages to help them grow into the full stature of Christ and be mobilized into their Christian vocation

Forming people into the body of Christ includes Christian education opportunities that are lifelong, life-wide, and life-deep. Our goal is to have 100% of our Average Weekly Attendance belong to a Group where they are known, loved, and grow in their relationship with Jesus.

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION on Sunday mornings.

- Sunday Morning Rector's Forum
 - Spring 2023: Leadership and Ephesians 4; Local Outreach leaders; Dr. Lauren Gamble on the history of the Rood.
 - Fall 2023: It's the End of the World. Revelation and biblical interpretation. Clergy and guest speakers (including David Rowe and Canon Natalie.)
- Sunday Morning Parents' Group
 - Spring 2023: Bad Parenting of the Bible. Led by Michael+.
- Advent and the Arts series led by Angela Tipps and Lauren Gamble.
- Guest speakers and special programs included:
 - Amber Noel, director of The Living Church Institute and associate director of The Living Church magazine.
 - MAJ Steve Estes spoke about how leadership builds culture, especially the culture of the church.
 - Canon Natalie Simon-Arendse from Cape Town, South Africa taught on Revelation and Justice in the context of Apartheid.
 - Vestry information session held in the winter and fall to create an open forum with parishioners and vestry leaders.
 - Member engagement visioning session.

MEAT AND POTATOES:

Sixteen participants joined Fr. Michael for a year of prayer, study, and theological reflection. This year, the group read about major figures in Church History. Developed specifically for St. Paul's, Meat and Potatoes is a 3-year cycle of study of Church History, Anglican Liturgy and Theology, and Holy Scripture.

PILGRIMAGE:

As a faith exploration program for adults, Pilgrimage continues to engage new parishioners with eight participants in the Spring and ten participants in the fall. In Spring 2023, seven participants were confirmed and one was received. Led by Joyce Adkins and David Rowe.

ONGOING OPPORTUNITIES:

- 9:50 a.m. (Monday-Friday): Daily "bite-sized" Bible Study and Prayer had an average of 5 people daily in attendance.
- Weekday clergy and staff bible study at 10:00 a.m. averaged five daily attendees
- Discipleship/Bible Study groups: four groups meet weekly.
- Wednesday Lectionary Bible Study had an average of 15 attendees, with 25 on the roster. Led by Jerry Reddit.
- Lectio Divina 10:00 a.m. each Thursday in St. Andrew's Chapel had an average of six attendees.
- Contemplative Prayer, 4:00 p.m. Sunday afternoons averaged five a week

ANTI-RACISM TASK FORCE:

12 parishioners meet regularly with friends from other churches to pray and study. They continued The American Lament Project and read Jemar Tisby's *How to Fight Racism*. The group went on pilgrimage to Montgomery and took multiple day trips around Rutherford County to historically significant sites.

BOOK STUDIES:

- Summer Book study. David Rowe led a discussion of *The Liturgy of the Ordinary* by Tish Harrison Warren for five participants.
- The CONNECT team is reading *Toxic Charity* by Robert Lupton.

SPECIAL PROGRAMMING:

- Lenten Soup Supper adult programming led by clergy was Praying the Psalms of our Lenten Lectionary.
- Paths to Creativity and Spiritual Growth was a five-part series exploring how the arts can positively enhance spiritual growth. Four individuals participated in this program led by Cindy Phiffer.
- Parenting in Chaotic Times: an Insight program on how we can pray and work to raise our children while remaining calm, strong, and joyful! This event had eight in attendance with plans to host again in 2024. Coordinated by Susanne Hebden, Cindy Guèvart, and Rhonda Pendergrass.

YOUTH MINISTRY

St. Paul's is blessed to have Chase Benefiel coordinating our youth ministry. Chase works closely with youth, communications, and member engagement.

Youth Sunday School

Youth Sunday School has focused on the sermon passages, asking questions about the plain sense meaning of the text, what it tells us about God, and how it informs our lives. Sunday formation has been led by Kim Baumann, Lynn Miller, Elizabeth Myers (in the spring), and Nancy Loucky.

Sunday Night Live (SNL)

SNL on Sunday evenings from 5:00 - 7:00 p.m., has focused on what it means to have a life of prayer as an Episcopalian. Youth pray either Evening Prayer or Compline every week and focus on one of the daily office passages, and enjoy games and meals provided by parents of youth! SNL has been led by Jennifer Groth and Chase Benefiel.

Tuesday Morning Bible Study

High Schoolers met with Chase at 6:30 a.m. in the fall on Tuesday mornings to discuss and pray the Psalms (and eat a few bagels). Volunteer leaders with Chase are Joyce Adkins and Richard Detmer.

Youth Retreats

In the Spring, our youth confirmands gathered for a retreat as they prepared for their Confirmations. In the Fall, the Youth Retreat and the Parish Camp Out happened concurrently. The youth compared the rubrics for the Prayers of the People in the Book of Common Prayer with Jesus's lesson on prayer in Matthew 6. We also hiked, ate many (many) Uncrustables, and led the Prayers of the People for the campout Eucharist.

CHILDREN'S & FAMILY MINISTRIES

This year Cindy Guèvart, who has been with St. Paul's since 2016, moved into an expanded role as the Director of Children's and Family Ministries. Cindy continued to lead Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, Vacation Bible School, Club 3-4-5, various seasonal events, and worked with leaders of the Nursery and Children's Church. She took on additional responsibilities which are very much in her gift-set: Growing our community of families as they form their children into the body of Christ.

Also, our children's ministry leadership at St. Paul's hosted a children's minister gathering with representation from 10 churches in the diocese that encouraged friendship-building and professional development.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS)

Our Christian Education program for children aged 3 to 5th grade. CGS employs a Montessori approach to spiritual formation and recognizes that children have a strong religious life, that God is present to them, and that they can develop a conscious and intimate relationship with God. Ashley Heren is serving as the lead teacher for level I. Cindy Guevart is leads level II, and Sudi Lubonecki is the guide for level III. Cindy is thankful for those who volunteer to assist in each atrium, though there is still a need for more teachers and parental support. Vacation Bible School

- Monthly Parents' Night Out programs supported families by providing childcare for parents to enjoy an eveningout together. Each month averaged 15 children in the program.

CONNECT Ministry





Starting in the fall of 2023, St. Paul's CONNECT Ministry partnered with Launch Point, a United Way initiative designed to improve the financial stability of families residing in Rutherford and Cannon Counties. From a variety of local organizations, including CONNECT, the United Way now has 12 women in its program.



Undie Sunday

Thanks to your generosity, the Lectionary Bible Study Group collected 570 items for The Journey Home and raised an additional \$445 which will be used to purchase winter underwear for The Journey Home's clients. Dry socks and fresh underwear help every person feel more dignity.



St. Paul's Habitat for Humanity

St. Paul's helped coordinate volunteers to work at various building sites in the spring of 2023, and in late November had **14 parishioners** volunteer for a Habitat house panel build.

Beekeeper's Association

The Saint Paul's Beekeeping Association continues to flourish, with Nick and Stacy Clark joining the Louckys and Owens this year. The group provides beekeeping advice and support. Some of the honey and wax products are donated to the annual craft and bake sale to support the Connect Ministry. This group is happy to help new members get started and become sustaining beekeepers.



Food Drive

This year, St. Paul's gave over 3,901 items of nonperishable food and \$3,458 to Nourish Food Bank.

Monetary donations are used to purchase essentials like milk, eggs, and butter at discounted prices, as well as items for babies, including formula and diapers.

Craft & Bake

This annual event held each November features baked goods, a silent auction and arts & crafts for sale.

Monies generated through the event are split between the CONNECT Ministry and the Rector/Associate Rector's Discretionary Funds.

This year \$2194 was raised.

Coldest Nights

Coldest Nights is an emergency cold weather shelter for unhoused people in our community. The Journey Home organizes the ministry in cooperation with St. Paul's, First Baptist, Murfreesboro Rescue Mission, Murfreesboro Cold Patrol, and volunteers from other churches.

Tutoring at The Boys and Girls Club

This year at The Boys and Girls Club of Rutherford County two of St. Paul's parishioners, Marta Van Hoose and Nancy Loucky, volunteered approximately **450 hours** tutoring students.








323 EAST MAIN ST OVERVIEW

CAMPUS IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS & GIFTS

DESIGNATED GIFTS (Fully funded by specified gracious parishioner donations, not paid through pledges/operating budget)

- Altar renovations
 - The floor behind the altar chairs was expanded to accommodate three chairs on each side for the altar party.
 - A portion of the left-side altar rail was removed to provide easier access for the choir and pianists.
- The Great Rood

In the fall of 2022, St. Paul's commissioned Davis d'Ambly, one of our nation's most accomplished liturgical artists, to create a Great Rood funded fully from gracious donations made over time to St. Paul's gifts and memorial fund in honor of loved ones. d'Ambly's work graces such churches as the Bruton Parish Church (Williamsburg, VA) and St. Thomas, 5th Ave. (New York City). The commission was the product of two years of study, research, consultation, prayer, and reflection by the St. Paul's Art & Design Committee and its chair, Lauren Gamble, PhD (Yale, Art History).




Figure 1 Figure 2 Figure 3

A Rood is a traditional Anglican church cross installed where the nave and chancel meet. Our Great Rood will be in the form of a *Stabat Mater* (Latin for "mother was standing"), with Christ crucified flanked by Mary and the Apostle John, as related in the 19th chapter of the Gospel of John. The completed Rood will be suspended from the chancel arch and will provide a beautiful visual focus for our worship. The figures are carved from wood and will be stained to preserve the wood's natural color.

d'Ambly and his carvers are hard at work. They expect to complete the Great Rood in the late fall of 2024. We are delighted to have pictures of the work in progress. Figure 1 shows the rough carving of Mary. Figure 2 shows the progress on the statue of the Apostle John. All will come together with Christ on the Cross as shown in the original plan, in figure 3.

We all look forward to this artwork's completion. We are grateful for the hard work and inspired vision of Lauren Gamble and the Arts & Design Committee, and for the gifts of the artist and carvers. The Great Rood will add a sense of the beauty and mystery of God's grace to our worship at St. Paul's.

CAMPUS IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS & GIFTS continued

GENERAL MAINTENANCE PROJECTS (FUNDED BY OUR OPERATING BUDGET)

- Landscaping
 - A landscape committee was brought together to work on a plan to recover the grounds from damage from the prior harsh winter and develop a plan for new plantings, improve campus lighting and irrigation.
 - Jim Dillon, expert gardener and parishioner, volunteered his time to help prune bushes and clean up front and side lawns.
 - The youth confirmands spent the morning of their retreat mulching the side lawn on N. Academy and the Courtyard flower beds.
- HVAC/Plumbing
 - New 20-ton HVAC unit for the Nave.
 - Repairs completed for the boiler loop to heat the Chancel.
 - New HVAC unit for the Youth Room.
 - New thermostats for the Wall Building and Nave.
 - New heat exchanger installed in a HVAC unit on the Parish Hall second floor.
 - New water heater installed in the Sacristy.
- Wall Building
 - Mold remediation and painting for the Associate Rector and Parish Administrator offices.
 - New air receiver installed to improve air circulation and mitigate risk for future mold growth.
 - New storefront door installed for the parish office (photos below).
- Blinds were ordered for installation in the Children's Church room.
- Storage was improved by cleaning out the attic and adding shelving units to two closets located on the Parish Hall second floor.
